

'Chantilly' is an exhibition of ceramics, paintings and drawings which explores the materiality of lace and cream as metaphors. Chantilly, in France, is famous for delicate, floral patterned silk bobbin lace, whipped cream as well as for Rococo styled soft paste porcelain. This exhibition combines the imagery of intricate, fine lace with the ethereal quality of white, softly peaked whipped cream. Both these materials evoke a sense of lightness, fragility and transience. These textures are explored as they occur in many different contexts. Natural motifs, such as clouds and waves and flowers, emphasis the underlying symbolism— fragility and impermanence. Many of the works are porcelain with floral themes, referencing Chantilly's connection with porcelain.

#### WOLLOMBI -School Concert

The Wollombi Public School concert, which was held on the 11<sup>th</sup> instant, proved to be a most successful function, and reflects great credit on both the pupils and the two ladies who organised it, Miss Baker and Miss Andrews, who gave their time and talents to the cause.

The stage decorations alone must have taken considerable time and labour. The children, who ranged from 5 years upward, went through the action songs and dances with perfect rhythm, although some of the items were very long and trying to children so young.

During the interval, Mr. R. McBlane. headmaster, presented Edward Spry with a medal, which was donated by Mr. H. Harris, jeweller of Cessnock, for general good work in the school. Mr. Clyne (formerly headmaster, and now of Thornton) presented Miss Dorothy Forbes and Miss Doris Hawkins with prizes for; music, donated by their teacher, Miss Andrews.

The public school inspector said that it gave him great pleasure to be present and remarked that the performance was far beyond his expectations, and could not be excelled in any school in the State. He stated that he intended to bring the work of Miss Andrews under the notice of his department as she received no pay for what she did. He thanked the public for their patronage. The parents for providing the dresses, the pupils for their splendid performance, and. above all', the ladies who organised the concert, and also Mr. Harris, a former pupil of the school, 'for donating the medal. Mr. Harris said that he was a pupil at the Wollombi School more than 30 years ago and was pleased to be present at the concert. He indicated that he would donate a guinea trophy next year, to be selected by the winner. It is also noteworthy that the inspector, in his annual report of the school, placed on record his appreciation of the pupils' performance, and also of the good work done by Miss Andrews and Miss Baker in bringing the function to a successful ensue.

The school library will benefit to the extent of £10/l5/-.



### Capeweed (Arctotheca calendula)

Flowering in your lawn or pasture now!

Capeweed is a member of the sunflower family. It is a low growing annual plant that emerges in spring, producing a profusion of yellow flowers that are attractive to honeybees and native bees alike. The daisy-like flowers have a black centre while the grey-green succulent leaves form a rosette close to the ground.

While the plant has nutritional value for stock, areas of high infestation can cause nitrogen poisoning when ingested. When capeweed dies off later in summer, it can leave patches of bare soil, having outcompeted other grasses. Capeweed seeds are easily carried by wind and birds and can germinate in bushland. It is not known whether native Australian animals will eat the plant.

It is possible to remove capeweed plants using a fork to dig up the entire root system. For alternative control measures, consult the following sources:



# Wollombi of Old

Wollombi. October 1853.

To give an idea of what is esteemed the value of land in this district, at a land sale on the 23rd ultimo, one thirty-acre farm was sold at £1, and another at £1 10s. per acre.

The Maitland Road trust have subjected the residents of this district to a tax which can

scarcely be said to be justified. A large sum has been placed at their disposal by the Government, and without having expended that money in placing the roads in repair, an excessively high tax is now being levied as tolls. Can those gentlemen reconcile it to their own minds, that on any principle based on justice or common sense, that a heavy tax is to be levied on the community without an equivalent advantage. Let the roads be put in repair and then tolls can be justly levied for keeping them in a proper state, but in the present disgraceful state of the road from Maitland to the

Wollombi, to levy tolls " is too bad."

When are our legislators to apply their minds to the consideration of an Act of Council based in some comprehensible principle, applicable to all roads throughout the colony, and they place in abeyance for the public good our numerous



There are few more thrilling ways to take in the beauty of Cessnock local government area than on two wheels. A popular motorcycle tourist route through Cessnock LGA has been the focus of recent major upgrades, with improvements at two key intersections set to make it safer and more comfortable for the many riders who take to our roads each year.

Last month, work finished on \$1.3 million worth of safety improvements on George Downes Drive, at the intersection of Great Northern Road, Bucketty.

The upgrades, funded by the NSW Government's Towards Zero Safer Roads Program, included shoulder widening, tree removal, roadside drainage improvements, pavement upgrades and resurfacing, and increased safety infrastructure including a guardrail and motorcycle protection rail, as well as line marking and delineation.

It comes off the back of \$250,000 worth of upgrades to Rhino Corner – the intersection of Glenloona Road and Great North Road, Laguna - which included road resurfacing in a flood risk area, and raising the height of the road from a one-in-one-year flood level to a one-in-20-year flood level.

Cessnock City Mayor Daniel Watton said it was a boost for two-wheeled tourism in the Cessnock LGA.

"Some of the most scenic routes for motorcycle enthusiasts in NSW pass through the region," said Clr Watton.

"The tourist route through the picturesque Wollombi Valley is a ride every motorcycle enthusiast should experience. Though after your first visit, I have no doubt you'll be eager to return again soon.

"These upgrades will significantly improve the already wonderful experience of enjoying our beautiful local government area from the road."

#### Independent expert enlisted to guide financial sustainability

Cessnock City Council has engaged an independent expert, Professor Joseph Drew, to support I ts drive towards financial sustainability.

This significant step in Cessnock City Council's financial sustainability journey involves an extensive consultation process with the community, led by Professor Drew, to explore all relevant factors required for an application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for a special variation.

Commencing last week, this latest engagement follows Council's commissioning of the University of Newcastle in late 2024 to undertake a review of its financial sustainability, which was also led by Professor Drew. The work is orientated towards providing Council and IPART with a robust evidence brief and the report will principally be orientated around audited financial data, as well as Australian Bureau of Statistics figures, of Cessnock and other councils.

Professor Drew is a leading scholar in local government finance, previously serving as Professor of Local Government Economics at the University of Newcastle's Institute for Regional Futures and now retired from full-time work. He has an extensive academic background, including qualifications as an accountant, economist, natural law philosopher, and mathematician. Professor Drew has published numerous books and articles in top-tier journals and has consulted for various governments and organisations both in Australia and internationally.

He will be joined in this phase of work by Professors Yunji Kim (Seoul National University), Masato Miyazaki (Saitama University) and Diogo Cuhna Ferreira (Lisbon University). Cessnock City Mayor Dan Watton stressed the importance of independent expertise to guide Council's drive towards financial sustainability, and welcomed the engagement of Professor Drew and his team of three scholars. "As a fast-growing local government area, Council finances are increasingly under pressure as we work to deliver the range of quality services and infrastructure expected by our community," said Clr Watton.

"These budget challenges are largely due to factors such as an ageing and growing asset base, cost shifting by successive state governments, and increases to costs and materials outpacing allowable rate increases capped by the state government.

"These problems are not unique to our Council, and are faced by the vast majority of the local government sector. "It's vital that Council continues to do the work to achieve a financially sustainable future, and the independent advice from Professor Drew's team will provide the foundations to make informed decisions guided by the best evidence."

Professor Drew will be leading a series of community engagement sessions in November. In the meantime, visit www.cessnock.nsw.gov.au/financialsustainability for more information.

#### **MAYORAL COLUMN**

It's strange, but true: the NSW Government considers Cessnock local government area to be metropolitan – when it comes to charging a waste levy. Since a redraw of waste levy boundaries brought the Hunter and Illawarra into the metro fold in 2006/07, Cessnock City Council has paid much higher charges than it would have if it was properly classified as a Regional Levy Area.

Being a Metropolitan Levy Area costs our council an extra \$73.90 per tonne (\$174.20 per tonne as opposed to \$100.30 per tonne for regional areas) – the same rate applied to Sydney councils. It means Cessnock pays about \$739,000 per year more at 10,000 tonnes. At 20,000 tonnes, it's almost an extra \$1.5 million. The ongoing NSW Waste Levy Review is a chance for the NSW Government to correct this inequity.

After my Mayoral Minute at the September council meeting received unanimous support, Council will write to NSW Minister for the Environment Penny Sharpe and the three state MPs whose electorates include part of our LGA, urging a change to our classification.

I encourage you to write to your local state MP, whether it's Clayton Barr in the Cessnock electorate, Jenny Aitchison in the seat of Maitland, or Dave Layzell in Upper Hunter, and help advocate for our LGA to be rid of this needless waste of money.

The metropolitan classification, despite our wonderful community clearly being regional, places a significant burden on ratepayers. Reclassification will reduce costs for Council and ratepayers, and better reflect the reality of our community. To me, it's pretty cut and dry – we are simply being overcharged.

Congratulations to CIr Tracey Harrington on being elected Deputy Mayor of Cessnock City Council at our September meeting, and thanks also to CIr Mitchell Hill for his service to the community in the role for the past year. CIr Harrington is a lifelong local and has run a business in Cessnock for more than two decades. I look forward to working closely with CIr Harrington over the next 12 months.

Finally, don't forget to think about those exceptional individuals, groups and events in our community deserving of recognition. Nominations are open for Cessnock City Council's 2026 Australia Day Awards.
